PHLEBOTOMY

Phlebotomy – the drawing of blood – has been practiced for centuries and is still one of the most common invasive procedures in health care.

Identify and prepare the patient Where the patient is conscious, follow the steps

outlined below.

• Introduce yourself to the patient and ask the patient to state their full name.

• Check that the billing activity sheet matches the patient's identity (i.e. match the patient's details with the billing sheet, to ensure accurate identification). • Ask whether the patent has allergies, phobias or has ever fainted during previous injections or blood draws.

• If the patient is anxious or afraid, reassure the person and ask what would make them more comfortable.

• Make the patient comfortable in a supine position (if possible).

• Place a clean paper or towel under the patient's arm.

• Make sure area was punctured no bleeding or hematoma was not there.

• Procedure should be quick.

• When taking blood, Phlebotomist should wear well-fitting, non-sterile, sterile gloves, and should also carry out hand hygiene before and after each patient procedure, before putting on gloves and after removing them.
